London Youth Games is run by the LYG Foundation; a registered charity. The games were established in 1977 and have run every year since then and is now Europe's largest youth sports festival. The season of events traditionally starts in November with Cross Country and culminates with the Finals event in July where the winning Borough are awarded with the Jubilee Trophy.

The first event of the season is the Cross Country activity, this takes place at Parliament Hill on the heathlands, there are approximately 1800 number of participants who will take place in waves based on their age groups. Waves will be split into ages and distances run.

Parliament Hill is an open area of heath and grass land in Hampstead Heath, the park will remain open to the public on the event day, however it is considered that the proposed numbers and route will not result in significant overcrowding.

The route crosses an existing footpath, LYG will ensure that there is suitable marshals in place to open and close this footpath as appropriate to prevent conflict between runners and pedestrians.

Key areas of the route and event space will have suitable barrier or similar to control access.

Logical Safety Solutions, hereafter referred to as LSS, has been appointed by London Youth Games, hereafter referred to as LYG, to provide a Safety Plan and various Risk Assessments to cover their works throughout the 2022-2023 LYG Season.



LYG will have a suitable number of staff and volunteers to manage the activity.

This RA will cover the Cross Country event taking place at Parliament Hill on Saturday 18th November 2023.

Information relating to the event is as outlined in the emails and discussions between Eleanor Western (LSS) and Lucy Baines of LYG along with information provided in supplied project documentation.

See the Event Safety Plan for full details of the activity see the Operations Plan (LYG).
